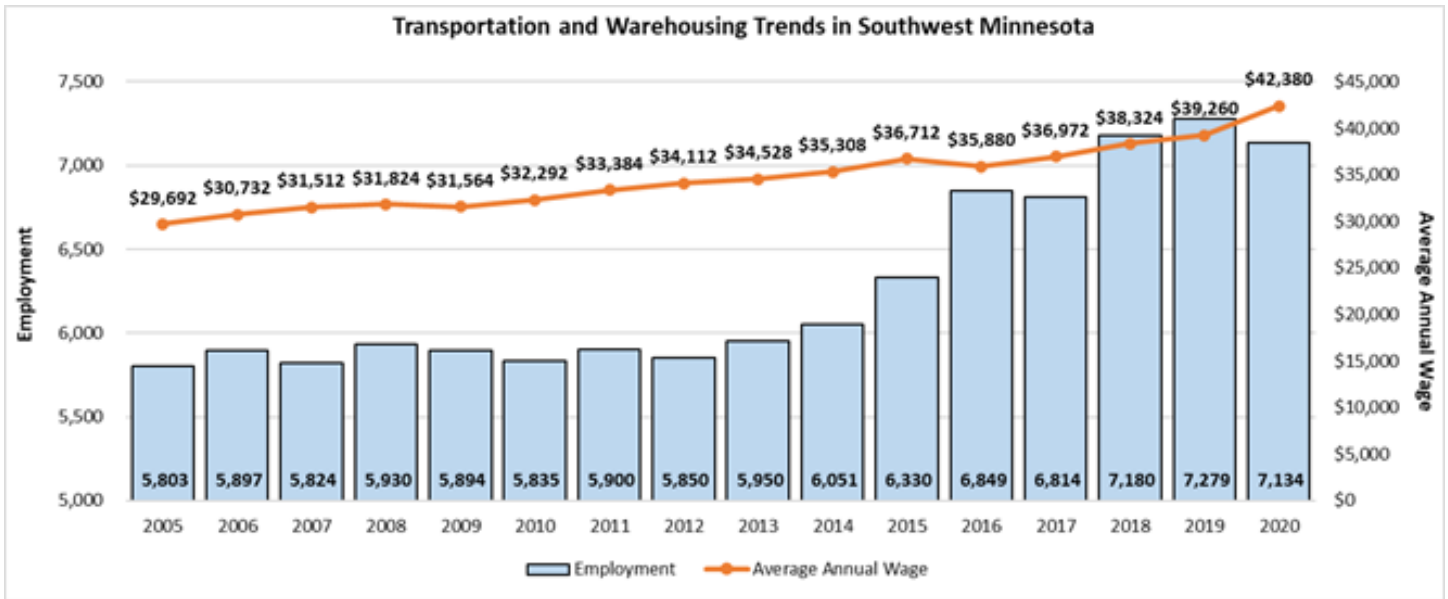
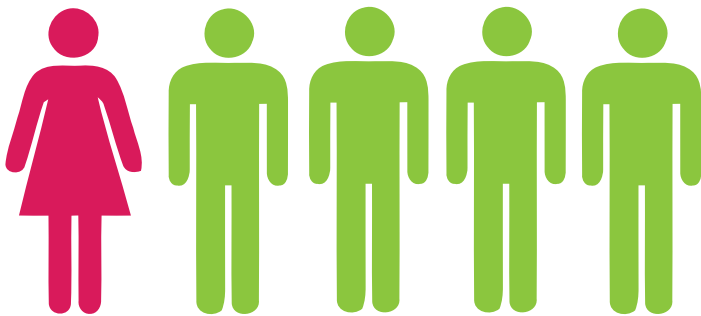


TRANSPORTATION CAREERS

IN SOUTHWEST AND SOUTH CENTRAL MINNESOTA



Transportation and warehousing is the second fastest growing industry in south central and southwest Minnesota, adding almost 1,300 jobs from 2005 to 2020, an increase of 22.9%. Increasing demand for workers and large numbers of openings has driven median wages higher than typical in the region, to \$20.37 per hour in 2020.

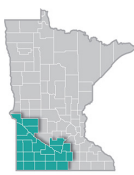


FEMALES HOLD 1 OUT OF EVERY 5 JOBS IN TRANSPORTATION AND WAREHOUSING

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CAREER PATHS IN TRANSPORTATION

4-YEAR OR MORE COLLEGE DEGREE AND/OR EQUIVALENT EXPERIENCE

- TRANSPORTATION, STORAGE & DISTRIBUTION MANAGERS \$39.74** Plan, direct, or coordinate transportation, storage, or distribution activities in accordance with organizational policies and applicable government laws or regulations. Includes logistics managers.
- LOGISTICIAN \$31.52** Analyze and coordinate the logistical functions of a firm or organization. Responsible for the entire life cycle of a product, including acquisition, distribution, internal allocation, delivery, and final disposal of resources.

1-2 YEAR COLLEGE DEGREE (OR CREDENTIAL)

- DIESEL ENGINE SPECIALIST \$23.42** Diagnose, adjust, repair, or overhaul buses and trucks, or maintain and repair any type of diesel engine. Includes mechanics working primarily with automobile or marine diesel engines.
- AUTO SERVICE TECH/ MECHANIC \$17.84** Diagnose, adjust, repair, or overhaul automotive vehicles.

HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA OR GED AND/ OR EXPERIENCE

- HEAVY & TRACTOR TRAILER TRUCK DRIVER \$21.89** Drive a tractor-trailer combination or a truck with a capacity of at least 26,000 pounds Gross Vehicle Weight (GVW). May be required to unload truck. Requires commercial driver's license.
- LABORERS & FREIGHT, STOCK & MATERIAL MOVERS \$15.45** Manually move freight, stock, or other materials or perform other general labor.
- HIGHWAY MAINTENANCE WORKER \$25.48** Maintain highways, municipal and rural roads, airport runways, and rights-of-way. Duties include patching potholes or exposed pavement, repairing guard rails, highway markers, and snow fences. May also trim or clear brush from along road or plow snow from roadways.
- DISPATCHER \$21.80** Schedule and dispatch workers, work crews, equipment, or service vehicles for conveyance of materials, freight, or passengers, or for normal installation, service, or emergency repairs rendered outside the place of business. Duties may include using radio, telephone, or computer to transmit assignments and competing statistics and reports on work progress.

HEAVY & TRACTOR-TRAILER TRUCK DRIVERS

AUTOMOTIVE SERVICE TECHNICIAN

EDUCATION

- Usually a high school diploma and attend a professional truck driving school. They must have a commercial driver's license (CDL).
- High school diploma or equivalent. Typically need to complete a vocational or other postsecondary education program in automotive service technology.

WHAT THEY DO

- Most tractor-trailer drivers are long haul drivers. There are opportunities for Heavy Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers in road construction, you local and state highway departments, excavating, quarries, and agriculture.
- Inspect, maintain, and repair cars and light trucks. They use computers and scanning tools frequently to test parts and systems to identify problems, perform basic maintenance, including oil changes and tire rotations, and repair or replace worn parts. Explains automotive problems and repairs to clients.

EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES

HEAVY & TRACTOR-TRAILER TRUCK DRIVERS

Employment of heavy and tractor-trailer truck drivers is projected to grow 7.3 percent from 2018 to 2028, about as fast as the average for all occupations. As the demand for goods increases, more truck drivers will be needed to keep supply chains moving.

AUTOMOTIVE SERVICE TECHNICIAN

Employment of automotive service technicians and mechanic is projected to have 1,411 openings in the area between 2018 to 2028. More entry-level automotive service technicians will be needed to perform basic maintenance and repairs as the number of vehicles in use continues to rise.

WORK ENVIRONMENT

- Working as a long-haul truck driver is a major lifestyle choice because these drivers can be away from home for days or weeks at a time. Heavy & Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers are typically in an enclosed vehicle or equipment. Drivers can also work outdoors and be exposed to weather conditions.
- Most service technicians work full time, and many work evenings or weekends. Overtime is common.

- HEAVY & TRACTOR-TRAILER TRUCK DRIVERS: \$18.36 (2018) / \$24.98 (2028)
- AUTOMOTIVE SERVICE TECHNICIAN: \$11.97 (2018) / \$22.59 (2028)

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
